

Printing the newsletter can't start until I finish writing. I am finding it difficult to choose the few highlights from the 7 years at Saint Paul and 20+ years in Southeastern Minnesota to put on this page.

The first Advent season I spent with you, and each of the congregations I served, I encouraged families to leave out their nativity all year long. I suggested that when a visitor noticed the out-of-season nativity, you

could say, I'm a follower of Jesus all year. There were many things like this, including writing council reports, telling Bible stories at VBS, attending meetings, locking up the building after Christmas Eve worship, preaching over crying babies and coughing adults, laughing during children's sermons and occasionally getting teary over the amazing grace God shows us, that were part of ministry in each congregation I served. There are also many things that were unique to the years I spent at Saint Paul.

COVID entered our world and the highlight is Saint Paul did so much more than survive. Thanks to a few skilled and dedicated volunteers, Saint Paul had quality pre-recorded and then live streamed services while many churches were still relying on the pastor's cell phone to send out worship. When the public school system was looking for space to get younger kids back in classrooms ASAP, the council said YES to sharing our building. When we could not worship inside, volunteers lit hundreds of luminaries to celebrate All Saints. When Christmas arrived, more volunteers put together a live nativity so successful, cars were lined up past the bridge and in sub-zero temps Saint Paul offered Christmas Eve worship with the sacrament of Holy Communion in the parking lot. I wore Christmas lights instead of my cross to supplement the luminaries. The Red Cross could not stop their live-saving work for a pandemic, so Saint Paul opened the doors again. After all, who would know more about keeping people safe while collecting blood?

The highlight of 2023 was celebrating all that God had done through the people of Saint Paul in the past 125 years. Inviting former pastors back to preach, as well as monthly mini celebrations helped us remember and honor our ancestors in faith and prepare for the future. The remodeling that followed the 125th anniversary is well underway. Thanks to even more volunteers, we now have a noteworthy float for annual use in the Cheese-fest parade. We changed the structure for Confirmation and Sunday School and in doing so greatly improved attendance and learning outcomes. We took on the task of keeping the local food shelf supplied with toilet paper as well as all the traditional things. In the last 7 years, we hired many new staff members, rewrote job descriptions and I assure you; you have a team of talented, dedicated, Godly staff members. These are just a few of the highlights we lived through together in the years I spent serving God alongside you at Saint Paul.

The biggest highlight of my 21 years of ordained ministry started in 2013. After years of fund raising and sending boxes of supplies to Haiti, in support of a school started by a Haitian seminary classmate, I lead a team of 10 from SEMN to Haiti. As part of that first trip, 5 classrooms were begun and in the intervening years more teams have built 6 more rooms, taught VBS to groups as large as 300, held health clinics, and taught basic life skills to men and women. The school that started with 50 kids under a corrugated-tin roof is now 11 rooms with 438 kids and 20 members of staff. In a country where 80% of the people live in poverty and 40% of adults cannot read, God's unconditional grace, love and acceptance is shown through education and lunch for students who would have neither, without the hands, feet and offerings of Jesus' disciples scattered across southeastern Minnesota and central Illinois. It has been my great privilege and honor, as the pastor on the team traveling to Haiti, to preach God's Good News of Salvation and to stand at the beginning of the line as Haitians with nothing to spare were generous in sharing their prayers, blessings, and gifts of food with all members of the team.

A pastor is called to preside over the sacraments, teach and preach the word of God and travel with God's people through the highs and lows of life. I have been privileged to do all these things; and to sit with families as Jesus came to walk their loved one into eternal life, stand with nervous grooms as they waited at the end of the aisle, baptize many babies and a few adults, lead worship weekly, and remind congregations what an honor it is to be called by Jesus to use one's hands and feet as his disciples. The most important highlights of 7 years with Saint Paul Lutheran and 20+ years in SEMN synod of the ELCA happened while I was serving God, doing these things amid God's well-loved children.

A Season of Change at St. Paul

As we step into June—with school wrapping up and summer beginning—we also enter a season of transition here at St. Paul Lutheran Church.

Pastor Marie will be leading worship for the final time on **Sunday, June 15th**. This will be a special service filled with music and meaningful moments as we celebrate her ministry among us. Following the service, we will gather for a time of fellowship to thank Pastor Marie and wish her well in her retirement.

As part of this transition, it's important to understand the boundaries set by the Synod for retiring pastors. These guidelines are in place to support both Pastor Marie and our congregation as we move forward. After retirement, Pastor Marie will not:

- · Conduct funerals or weddings for members of St. Paul.
- · Participate in the pastoral care or mission of the congregation.
- · Return regularly or engage in the ongoing life of the church.
- · Retain membership at St. Paul.

These boundaries are not personal—they are pastoral best practices designed to help us all move into the next chapter with clarity and care. We kindly ask that you honor these guidelines and refrain from making requests that would place Pastor Marie in a difficult position.

Looking ahead, we want to assure you that the process of calling a new pastor is underway, even if it may not always be visible. While we are not yet at the stage of forming a call committee, we are following the steps provided by the Synod and are right on track. We promise to keep you informed every step of the way. We are in this together—and we will be OK.

SEMN Synod Call Process Overview for Congregations and Councils

The time between when a rostered leader announces his or her resignation and the next "settled" roster leader begins his or her call is a special time in the life of the congregation. It is a time filled with hope and expectation, of questioning and experimentation. It can also be a time of anxiety.

The first and foremost task of the congregation and if its leaders during this time is spiritual reflection and prayer. Prayer, bible study, and regular devotions will keep the congregation spiritually centered, responsive to the movement of the Spirit, and focused on what God's hopes for the congregation and its mission are.

A Four Phase Process: The congregations of the SEMN Synod participate in a Four Phase Call Process.

Phase I: The leave-taking/The Transition-time

At the point that a rostered leader announces that they are resigning their call at the congregation, a representative from the Office of the Bishop will meet with the congregational council to orient them to the call process. It is also at this time that the information about transitional pastoral support is shared with the council in order that they might make the best decision about how the congregation and ministries will be cared for upon the departure of the current rostered leader. This is also the time to celebrate the ministry that the rostered leader and the congregation have shared and the council forms and appoints the call committee.

Phase II: Self-Study Process and Ministry Site Profile Completion

In this phase, the call committee participates in an orientation facilitated by the assistant to the bishop. The call committee explores vision and ministry needs of the congregation by engaging the congregation by engaging the congregation in a self-study which may be accomplished through a variety of ways. The self-study leads to the completion of the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) which becomes an integral document shared with potential candidates as their first exposure to who your congregation is. After the MSP is completed and before it is officially submitted, a congregational town hall meeting may be held to review and comment on the MSP. This is attended by the Assistant to the Bishop in call process. After final edits are made to the MSP, it is submitted by the call committee on the ELCA website.

Phase III: Interviewing Candidate/Discerning the Candidate of Choice.

Once again, this phase begins with an orientation of the call committee. In the orientation the call committee will discuss its interview protocol, develop question for candidates and prepare packets of the information for candidates. It is also at this time that the call committee is ready to begin interviews, they will receive names of candidates from the Assistant to the Bishop in Call Process. The call committee engages in first interviews with each candidate that is presented to them. After the first interviews are completed, the call committee chairperson communicates with each candidate as to whether they will retain or release the candidate. The call committee engages in second interviews and gathers other information (including sermon and reference checks). The call committee discerns the candidate of choice and, with mutual consent from the candidate, presents the candidate of choice recommendation to congregation council. The congregation council sets the date for the special congregational call meeting.

Phase IV: Preparing for and Welcoming the New Pastor

The pastor, the council president and the Assistant to the Bishop coordinate a date for the installation of the new pastor. An assistant to the Bishop will be present to perform the rite of installation. Congregation council and call committee plan activities to welcome new pastor (and family) to the congregation and the community.
